CINDY HAWBAKER MEMORIAL AWARD

Cindy Hawbaker served as executive director of United Way of Franklin County for over 10 years from 1995 until 2006. Cindy was known for her handson leadership approach, often seen volunteering at organizations like Franklin County Therapeutic Riding Center, or Waynesboro Daycare Center.

During her tenure at United Way of Franklin County she introduced May of Caring, as well as the Gift In Kind Program, both of which set the tome for UWFC to expand our work beyond the dollars raised during campaign.

Friends and colleagues came together to create the Cynthia Hawbaker Memorial Award in her memory, and each year the recognition is presented to a volunteer in our community who has worked behind the scenes at a nonprofit organization. Ron Nelson began volunteering at Franklin County Therapeutic Riding Center as a side-walker for riding lessons, helping to ensure the safety of riders. By 2012, he had also taken on mowing and plowing, fixing fences, cutting fallen trees, dragging arenas and generally fixing anything that needed attention.

All of Ron's work helps to ensure the safety of the riders and the horses and volunteers at Franklin County Therapeutic Riding Center. With 15 acres of pasture and 9 stalls, maintenance on the tractor and other equipment, it seems that Ron never runs out of things to do.

Volunteers like Ron exemplify the heart of the Cynthia Hawbaker Memorial Award, by responding to the immediate needs of the program they serve and giving their valuable time to make a difference.

80 YEARS OF COMMUNITY IMPA


United Way of Franklin County celebrated 80 years as we entered our 2022-23 Campaign Season, marking the opportunity to look back at eight decades of community connections.

In 1942, as the roots of United Way were growing in Chambersburg through the formation of a Community Chest, with support from the Chamber of Commerce as well as local churches to respond to community needs through the depression and WW II. In the span of one month, a Community Chest was formed.

First organizations coming together into the Community Chest included Boy and Girl Scouts, Chambersburg Hospital, Children's Aid Society, the Franklin Pumper Fund, the Goodwill Ambulance Fund, Salvation Army and the USO. An inaugural campaign began in October and raised \$42,039. In 1966 the name was changed to Community Chest Red Cross United Appeal, and in 1967 became Chambersburg Area United Fund Community Chest Red Cross. In 1974-75 becoming United Way.

The communities of Waynesboro, Mercersburg and Greencastle had similar beginnings as Community Chests were organized and grown through the efforts of each community. Every effort was volunteer led and driven by community to serve the need of community.

In 1994 efforts across the county were brought together to form one United Way of Franklin County. Over time the name evolved, but the overall mission, to improve quality of lives by mobilizing the caring power of Franklin County, has remained consistent. *

STUFF THE BUS

Colorful pencil boxes and speckled composition books spilled out of donation boxes, as volunteers carried supplies into the United Way of Franklin County office. "It has been a very busy 8 weeks for our office, between collecting donations, sorting, and now distributing items before the start of school," says Amy Hicks, Executive Director. "We had partners from all over Franklin County helping make this year's event successful."

Between July 5th and 31st, UWFC collected donations at 38 area locations, placing nearly 100 donation receptacles in and around the county. Franklin County residents eagerly stepped up to the challenge, with organizations signing up or calling to request donation boxes almost daily. Several donation bins had to be emptied more than once and all the way into September, we were still receiving calls notifying us of donations ready for distribution.

UWFC staff and volunteers also traveled with a yellow school bus to various community events during July and early August, including the Y Cook Wednesdays event at the Waynesboro YMCA and Chambersfest in Chambersburg, collecting donations onsite.

The generosity of the community, and the overwhelming volunteer support we received for local students was incredible with inventory and distribution process concluding with over \$38,000 in supplies and donations.

The collected donations were distributed directly to all 5 Franklin County school districts: Chambersburg, Waynesboro, Greencastle-Antrim, Tuscarora, and Fannett-Metal. An email to United Way from one local principal reported, "The needs we are seeing are greater than ever! We have had twice as many families contacting us this year needing assistance to get ready for the first day of school. The supplies you dropped off are sorted and ready to be distributed at our elementary school. What a blessing for our littles!"

Each district has developed its own process for ensuring the supplies end up where most needed. Some of the districts indicated they will be passing out supplies directly to students, while others will use them to fulfill teacher wish lists.

A successful event like this would not be possible without the help of dedicated volunteers. Over 100 volunteer hours, and over 200 volunteer intern hours were dedicated to planning and executing Stuff the Bus. ★





COMMUNITY INFO EXPO

United Way of Franklin County hosted the Community Info Expo for the first time in October, inviting the public to visit and

learn about organizations across the community that provide services to help.

Formerly known as the Human Services Expo, this event was formerly hosted by the Franklin County Community Forum, and placed in the hands of United Way of Franklin County by members of the organizing committee who wished to see the event continue into the future under new leadership. Like many public gatherings, the pandemic forced the FCCF to pause the event through 2020 and 2021.

The Community Info Expo brought together nearly 50 vendors, providing a wide variety of information and resources. Following two years of restrained activity, organizations across Franklin County came together with an elevated level of energy, eager not only to showcase their work for the public, but also to reconnect within their networks.

Community Info Expo for 2023 is already in planning and will be hosted in early November of 2023. *

UNITED AGAINST HUNGER

In 2022, United Ways of Franklin and Washington Counties announced a partnership to fight food insecurity for the communities of Franklin County and Washington County.

The Verstandig Family, owners of Verstandig Broadcasting, Verstandig Law Firm, and Ledo's Pizza, reached out to local United Ways in early spring, with the idea of creating a special campaign to combat hunger and support organizations that provide food resources for people. The United Against Hunger fund was created to give greater access to free food, healthy options, food deliveries, and food resources.

For every dollar raised by community, the Verstandig Family matched a dollar, providing over \$60,000 to fight food insecurity in Franklin County.

All proceeds from United Against Hunger are invested locally, benefiting food pantries, homedelivered meals, backpack programs, fresh food distributions, food delivery to those living in food deserts, and other food-related programs. Programs from throughout Franklin County were invited to apply for funding, and grants were given to the following programs which requested support:




